Congratulations to the Y6 pupils at Pirbright Village Primary School on their success in this year's national assessments. The impact of school closures over the past three years has been felt across the whole education sector, but Pirbright's children didn't let a little thing like a global pandemic stop them learning!

Pirbright's children outperformed the national average in the proportion attaining expected standards in Reading, English spelling and grammar, Maths and Writing

73% of Pirbright Y6 pupils attained Reading, Writing & Maths combined, compared with 59% of children nationally.

PIBRIGHT HISTORIANS

Thanks to the Parish Council scrapbooks, another mystery has been solved – the date of the duck island on the pond. In May 1953, Lt-Col. Forbes wrote a brief description of Jim & Frank Rice's unique construction, based on old hot water tanks –

'The materials for the island were ferried out on a raft made from 5 gal. oil tanks & a wooden platform, which was pulled to & fro by a rope..... Wheelbarrow loads of earth etc were pushed onto the raft, emptied in the middle & then pulled back for a further load'



He also writes that Ted Rosher of Grove Farm Nurseries supplied the willow tree & Wally Searle (father of the late-lamented Derrick) built the little hut. Just a thought.....

Looking Out For Number One

Over the past few years, as a nation, as a community and as individuals, we have been through some pretty tough times, even though our troubles pale into insignificance compared to what the people of Ukraine are suffering. But there is one particular aspect of life today that I have seen, and which has rightly been welcomed and celebrated. So many people have stepped up to the mark to volunteer in community efforts to make life just a little more bearable for others, simply popping round to make sure their neighbours are OK, or picking up the phone for a chat. For those generous, kind-hearted souls the idea of 'looking out for number one' has been superseded by the notion of looking out for their neighbour.

When I first came to Pirbright I lived on my own, and I remember buying a cookbook: Delia Smith's 'One Is Fun'. I rarely used it, normally choosing to take the easy option and buy ready meals or eat out (and that's *not* much fun by yourself, believe me).

I always used to tell people that I never



minded being alone but I did mind being lonely – and there is a difference. I did feel very lonely sometimes, and that is most definitely *not* fun. At the time I was very much 'looking out for number one'.

Being alone has some benefits. For a start you don't have the same responsibilities that you have if you are in a steady relationship, or have a family. You have to learn to *share* all the responsibilities that come with living with other people.

Perhaps inevitably in times of pandemics, geopolitical turmoil, rising prices and social upheaval, some folk might be heard saying, 'where is God in all this? Why isn't he with us, as he promised to be?'

Then I am reminded of a poem called 'Footsteps in the Sand' written in 1936, when the world was emerging from the Great Depression and would soon be faced with the horrors of World War II. The writer is walking on the beach; looking back there are two sets of footprints. But then one set disappears, just as the writer is facing who knows what sort of trouble in their life. 'Where are you, God, when I need you most?'

'My child, that is when I am carrying you'.

God will never desert us. There may be just one set of footprints on our sandy beach right now, but if we look closely we might see that they go just a little deeper than they did. Alone we may sometimes be; lonely we should need never to be. God will *always* be there with us.

Community Sports Pavilion Commences!

Many will have noticed the erection of tree protection fencing around the perimeter of the existing cricket pavilion. This is an essential part of the commencement works undertaken by Lord Pirbright's Hall and Recreation Ground Charity in conjunction with the Parish Council. The works have included digging a strip of foundation to determine ground conditions, enable foundation design and help initiate the construction of the new pavilion.

By the time this newsletter reaches you, we will also have appointed the main contractor who will undertake the build and we hope to have agreed project milestones with Surrey County Council as part of Your Fund Surrey, to draw down funds to coincide with key stages of the build. It is planned for the rest of the building work to be undertaken over the winter period, so that the new Community Sports Pavilion will hopefully be ready for the 2023 sporting season. Fundraising continues and now more than ever, we need the support of the community to get behind the sports clubs and their final push of fundraising to help us to complete this project in style!!

AUGUST GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Watering is key this month, particularly container-grown plants and border plantings not yet established. Keep Camellias and Rhododendrons well-watered now to ensure good flower bud formation next spring.. Top up ponds and bird baths regularly. Stake tall or top-heavy dahlias and lilies to prevent wind and rain damage. Regular feeding and dead heading keeps the garden looking its best until autumn, dead-head lilies for a better flower display next year. Dead-head annual bedding plants and perennials to encourage them to flower into the autumn and stop them self-seeding, but it's a good idea to leave some to form seedheads, providing a nutritious food source for birds.. Cut back faded perennials to keep borders tidy. Cut back herbs now to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves you can harvest before the frost. Prune wisteria this month by removing all the whippy side-shoots from the main branch framework to about 20cm from their base (about five to seven leaves from the main stem). Trim any lavender

plants after they've finished flowering to keep them compact. Mow meadows now to help scatter established wildflower seeds. Lift and store onions, shallots and garlic when the tops have gone brown and bent over. Continue to pick fast maturing vegetables such as beans, peas and courgettes to encourage further cropping. House martins will stay to rear a second, or even a third brood, so during dry weather, place a dish of mud in the garden that they can use to repair their nests. Leave out dishes of

water and meat-based dog or cat food (ideally chicken flavour) for hedgehogs. The young hoglets need help fattening up before they go into hibernation in late autumn.

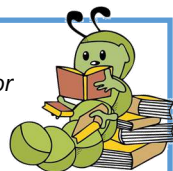
